STAY AWAKE

Staying awake is not easy. At night, it is quite natural for us to want to go to sleep. Even when Jesus asked them to do so in the Garden of Gethsemane his disciples could not stay awake. They fell asleep. But that same drowsiness can also overtake us. There is a dangerous type of sleep: it is the slumber of mediocrity. It comes when we forget our first love and grow satisfied with indifference, concerned only for an untroubled existence.

Without making any effort to love God daily, and awaiting the newness he constantly brings, we become mediocre, lukewarm and this slowly eats away at our faith.

So how can we rouse ourselves from the slumber of mediocrity? With the vigilance of prayer: for when we pray we light a candle in the darkness, and allow God to come close to us; it frees us from solitude and gives us hope. Praying and loving one another as Christ taught us: that is what it means to be watchful.

"Come Lord Jesus as we enter into this Season of Advent. Take our distracted hearts and make them watchful. Awaken within us the desire to pray, to love and to feel loved by others."

Feasts & Solemnities

Bishop, doctor. Thursday 7th Saint Ambrose white The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary Friday 8th white

St Ambrose's father was a Roman who was Praetorian in the Prefect of Gaul. The young Ambrose was born in Germany in the 4th century. He was educated in Rome and, following in his father's footsteps, was made prefect of Milan in Northern Italy. He was a follower of Catholicism but wasn't actually a baptised Christian when the Catholics who felt he had shown leadership in dealing with conflict between Catholics and Arians, pressed, with the Emperor's support, for him to be made Bishop of Milan. Within a week he was baptised, ordained and installed as bishop, giving his money to the poor and lands to the Church. He already knew Greek so was able to set to, studying theology from the East as well as the West of Christendom. He was not afraid to call the powerful to order, forcing the Emperor Theodosius, who had ordered a massacre of 7,000 people to do public penance. He was an intelligent man who valued learning, balancing firmness with gentleness, writing hymns that put singing and chant solidly in the liturgy (with clear Trinitarian doxology), and inspiring Augustine to convert to Catholicism.

O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee! By thy Immaculate Conception, O most Holy Virgin, obtain for us purity of heart and body, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. 'At Lourdes, Mary's message to Bernadette was penance, calling on us to focus on the sin that hinders our lives, doing our part so God can do his and forgive us.

Happy New Year! The violet month of preparation has begun. The Advent wreath with its 5 candles leads us week by week to prepare ourselves for 'God With Us'. Emmanuel.

Vatican News: Cardinal Parolin has been at COP28, representing Pope Francis (who has a lung infection and was advised by his doctors not to go to Dubai), calling for leaders to show courage, to' transcend their petty interests and to think in bigger terms.' Speaking of the conflicts in the Holy Land and in Ukraine, the Pope exhorts not to let hope 'be stolen from us.' It must be bedded in realism, recognising the 'interconnectedness of moral, social, environmental, political and economic crises. Individual problems are actually cause and consequence.' He calls leaders to have the 'courage to act - the audacity to throw ones heart over the obstacle, to renounce evil and step out of the narrow spaces of personal or national interests, to take those small possible steps of good every day to try to improve complicated situations and sow peace with patience and trust.'
