However, this arrangement is obviously subject to change, as dictated by his pastoral duties. Such changes will be notified at the Saturday Vigil Mass in Tayport and the Sunday morning Mass in Newport, and will also be posted on WhatsApp - Sam Morton has set up a dedicated group for this purpose (Daily Mass at St Fillan's) and placed the link on the Parish Group. Today's Gospel shows Elizabeth and her unborn son, John, reacting with joy to the nearness of the, as yet, unborn Christ. Elizabeth immediately understood that Mary was carrying in her womb Jesus, the longawaited Saviour. But how could John comprehend what was going on, to the point that he would leap for joy in his mother's womb? Maybe his reaction teaches us that we don't need to see God working in the world or solving our personal problems before we too can leap for joy. The joy that we receive, which comes from recognising the presence of Christ in our midst, is God's Christmas gift to us. It is a joy that comes from a faith that appreciates God working mercifully in our lives in ways that are both seen and unseen. Joy is the settled assurance that God is in control of all the details of my life, the quiet confidence that ultimately everything will work out alright, and the determined choice to praise God in every situation.

Saints and Feastdays

Wednesday, 25th December: **Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord.** A Christmas message given at a Christmas lunch this week by a now-retired minister of the Church of Scotland struck a chord. Touching upon the arrival of Mary and Joseph in Bethlehem, to find no accommodation available, a potential disaster in view of Mary's imminent labour, he eloquently described the events that followed. He laid emphasis upon the fact that, entering the world as, to all intents and purposes, a homeless child, with parents displaced from their own home, and being laid, not in a cot but in a manger, Jesus has a hard-wired link to the poor, the displaced and the homeless. It is for us, therefore, his representatives in this world, to show, by our actions, at this time above all, that we are prepared to follow where he led, showing his compassion and concern to those many who, in their daily struggle to survive, need all the help that we can give. Our Parish appeal for donations to Shelter in lieu of cards to fellow parishioners is but a small means whereby we can do this.

Thursday, 26th December: **St Stephen, the first martyr.** One of the deacons appointed by the Apostles to organize the distribution of food to the poor, Stephen performed many miracles and confounded the Jews in disputation. Humiliated, and having thus lost face, they fabricated false charges against him. At his trial he preached the risen Christ to them, so angering his oppressors that they stoned him to death. As he was dying, he prayed for his persecutors. A young man, Saul of Tarsus, was tending the cloaks of the stone-throwers, and went on to be a major player in the persecution of the early Church, only to encounter Jesus on the road to Damascus, which led to his conversion, becoming the great Apostle to the Gentiles, St Paul.

Parish Christmas Greetings

As has been advised elsewhere, it is again proposed to offer the opportunity for parishioners to send Christmas greetings to fellow members of our Parish community via a special Christmas issue of the weekly Newsletter, as we have done in previous years, The system will operate as follows: Boxes are provided in Our Lady's and in St Fillan's into which those wishing to avail themselves of this facility are asked to place their greeting, written as they would wish it to appear. The intention is that everyone so doing would make a donation to Shelter Scotland, either directly into the box or on-line. The latter is, of course, more beneficial to the charity, at least where the donor is a tax payer, as a Gift Aid declaration can be made, allowing Shelter to claim an additional 25% from the Government. In the current financial climate, that bit extra becomes much more significant. On-line donations can be made at <u>https://scotland.shelter.org.uk/</u>. Mgr Pat will ensure that money placed directly into the boxes is collected and sent as a single donation.
